When Amanda Breitbach started this project three years ago, she wanted to make images that could speak about the growth of corporate agriculture at the expense of family farming and the cost of the industrial agriculture model - to the environment and to people. Land/People investigates the decline of family farming and the emotional and spiritual issues that underlie the human relationship to land, making larger, universal relationships visible through Breitbach's, and her family's, own experiences.

The project combines panoramic and aerial images of her family's farmland in eastern Montana with intimate photographs of family members and domestic spaces. Viewers are invited to look both into and out of frames that emphasize the relationships between the spaces inside and those outside and to move


between those spaces.

Aaron Squadroni Mesabi Land Portraits

On View: September 13 - October 28 John Steffl Gallery



Aaron Squadroni is an artist from the Mesabi Iron Range in northern Minnesota. His work is centered on mining imagery and metalpoint drawing techniques. Squadroni's most recent work focuses on the Hull Rust mine, located in Hibbing, Minnesota, which is one of the largest open-pit mines in the world.

He draws with metal and found mine materials such as overburden rock, tailings, and taconite pellets from or near the mine site. Due to the unpredictability of drawing with these materials, Squadroni approaches his drawings as a collection of experiments. Each aerial image is named according to the latitude and longitude of the location that it is taken from. Focusing on the themes of nature, industry, and memory, he creates drawings that explore the visible and unseen tensions in the mining landscape.

Perhaps one of the greatest ironies of Postmodernism is that it has allowed for a more open discussion about the relationship between art and religion- a topic largely ignored by Modernism. While organized religions have prescribed rituals, doctines, and visual traditions, the manner in which people actually practice and express their faith often differs from institutional doctrine. This is especially true in America where religious beliefs are often cobbled together from a variety of sources or practices. As such, people live their beliefs through various forms of personalized expressions, outside of, or as an extension of organized religious practices- and in some cases, interpret doctrine in unorthodox ways. This independent and DIY approach to religious expression is embedded in the historic fabric of American culutre, and is still very much alive today. Luber's art making practices participate in, and extend historic artistic traditions between art and religion, yet does so through a visual language which reflects the complex relationship between spiritual beliefs and contemporary culture.

Patrick Luber **Exceptionally Ordinary**

At the core of Houser's thinking, he ponders reality. What does it mean to be here; coagulated matter, with the ability to question our very existence? How is the objective reality we experience created and maintained? To what amount and degree must we consider the inherent subjectivity of reality?

Symbolic themes of mysticism and philosopy develop within this work with an interesting relationship between 'super-reality' characters from comic books and figures from religious tales. By deconstructing the original narrative of these images and segments of text, the veracity ascribed to them is dissolved. This allows for a personal re-investigation into what we perceive to be 'truth'; illumination of the rhetoric constructing ideals within our mind,.

Houser strives to create disorienting visuals with esoteric content. These surreal images display the subconscious mind and ask the metaphysical question: 'what is real?'

Jehra Patrick is a visual artist, curator, and independent arts program producer, who works out of Minneapolis, MN. Jehra is a 2016 recipient of the Knight Arts Challenge and the Jerome Travel and Study Grant for Digital Producers, a 2018, 2015, and 2013, recipient of the Minnesota State Arts Board Artist Initiative Grant, a 2013 recipient of the McKnight Next Step Fund, and a 2011 recipient of the Jerome Foundation Fellowship for Emerging Artists.

In addition to her work as an artist, Jehra Patrick is Gallery Director and Curator for the Law Warschaw Gallery at Macalester College where she oversees the gallery's exhibition program and the college's art collection, creating networked exhibitions and audiences relevant on campus and in the community. Previously, Jehra served as Program Director for mnartists.org, where she oversaw the program's digital advancement, events, and outreach.

Jehra founded Waiting Room and WorkRoom, both new, non-fixed curatorial platforms which support artists through visual and personal networks. Jehra is a frequent writer, lecturer, visiting critic, and independent program organizer, on topics relevant to practices of visual artists.

She was recently selected to exhibit in the Minnesota Biennial at the Museum of Minnesota Art. Her work is in the permanent collections at the Tweed Museum of Art and The Department of the Interior in Washington DC.

Jennifer Webb

I teach classes on the history of art and urban planning in the Department of Art and Design at the University of Minnesota Duluth. Although I teach on much broader topics, my primary research area is the exploration of art, architecture, and visual culture in Italy in the 1400s. This focus means that I have been fortunate enough to live in different parts of Italy including Florence and the small town of Urbino. I also spent 3 months interview by Collegiona Party Courses being in Version by interning at the Collezione Peggy Guggenheim in Venice before starting my graduate program.

I moved to Duluth after finishing my PhD. Since coming here, I have also researched aspects of our own community. I've explored the collecting practices of the Congdon family and have spent the last few years delving deeply into the history of the Western neighborhoods of Duluth. I love being outside so I swim, bike, and kayak as much as I can in the summer and fall; in the winter I hike and snowshoe along the Superior Hiking Trail.

Why did you become a DAI member?

I became a member of the DAI because I believe in the mission of the organization. The commitment to education, to exhibiting work, and to artist-support serve our communities in many different ways that I believe are significant in providing Duluth with an identity which is a source of pride. In addition, the DAI often hosts exhibitions by emerging artists who attend colleges and universities in our region. This provides emerging artists with opportunities and support that would not be available in larger cities. Finally, the DAI has a long and rich history; as a history-nerd, I'm delighted to support an institution that is 111 years old.

How has art impacted you or your community?

I was lucky enough to have my first art history class in high school and that opportunity to study material culture and the built fabric alongside the history of beliefs and cultures immediately changed my life. I enjoy looking at art, asking questions about it, and also sharing the study of art with others. In addition, since moving here in 2006, I'm delighted by the way the arts landscape has changed in the Twin Ports. We are lucky to have such a rich arts community. There are so many places to see, listen, and watch contemporary art but also spaces to learn about historical material culture. In addition, the range of opportunities to "make" art have grown and offer so many entry points. This aspect of our community is one of the reasons I feel fortunate to have ended up in the Northland.

As an art enthusiast, what opportunities do you find at the DAI?

I attend many of the DAI openings and enjoy listening to the artists talk about their work in the gallery spaces. In addition, I have volunteered for the Art under the Canopy and love sharing the joy of art making with children. I've enjoyed attending the annual fundraisers over the years and look forward to the Masquerade Gala in November. I even took advantage of the rental opportunities offered through the DAI and hosted a celebration at the Lincoln Building.
