



If you're like me, you love a gallery visit with the great masters, regional work of this place we call Duluth, and work of emerging artists. What I also love are exhibitions that stretch the boundaries of my identity. The Duluth Art Institute is proud to present just that, an opportunity to engage with the constructs of race and its impact in our community. Our fall exhibitions demonstrate our effort to decolonize the institute in order to make space for absent narratives.

We have been working on this since 2017 with exhibitions about homelessness, Anishinaabe teachings, and what it's like to be profiled. This fall, we bring the MN Black Fine Art Show which opens our

minds up to the true impact of race and white privilege. You have not seen such direct representation of the issues around impact as in this show. Jean: The Inspiration behind the Birkenstein Arts Movement is the basis of teaching youth the power of art to make change in the community. This art retrospective highlights the inherent dignity of Black and Native Americans during a time when that ideal was deeply challenged, much like today. The Birkenstein Art Movement is a year-long DAI program for middle school students using art to manifest positive social change. These youth learn to use their voice to identify a challenge and make a plan for change. Akinomaage, by Vern Northup found its way to MN State Capitol where he and the DAI make history as both the first exhibition and the first Anishinaabe narrative under the public art legislation.

We have also integrated art class scholarships for all ages that require no more than a phone call expressing interest, furthering our vison for equity and art for all.

The DAI is focused on art for all and all for art. We envision equity in exhibition and learning opportunities, diverse narratives, and inclusive participation in order to build community. We are asking the questions "How do we tell our story" and "Who is included and who is locked out". The DAI has diversified its board of directors to include new voices and broad perspectives. I am grateful to this board for recognizing the power in hiring an Anishinaabekwe into a leadership role where only a handful of organizations nationwide have done so. I also appreciate the support the board gives to the DAI staff to be bold and forward thinking. The DAI has truly moved into meaningful inclusion.

As we continue to shape the civic spaces where we can gather and the exhilarating work of building community, we ask for your financial support. This fall we have five ways you can support this work at the DAI. Integrated Vision: Laura Andrews & Paula Gudmundson



December 2019 - March 2020 | George Morrison Gallery Reception: February 6, 5 - 8 PM

Digital landscapes and meditative harmonies invite viewers to find respite and connect with the surrounding world in Integrated Vision; a collaborative exhibition by Laura Andrews and Paula Gudmundson. Large scale images of nature will float on the walls of the Morrison Gallery, documenting the ever-changing state of our environment. Slow, thoughtful music projects a state of fluidity, transcending reality.

Minneapolis based visual artist Laura Andrews examines the relationships and interactions between people and the natural world. Shooting footage for *Tunnel 2* on the family tree farm where she learned to paint, Andrews captures the melancholic and nostalgic emotions accompanying change. Local Duluthian, Paula Gudmundson echoes this sentiment with improvised flute melodies, capturing the meditative quality of being... just being in nature. Together, both artists are questioning how one connects with our environment and how art can evoke curiosity about what is unfolding in nature, challenging society's value on staying busy.

Andrews is a landscape painter teaching drawing and painting at Minneapolis College. She has shown her work throughout the Midwest and explains that the low definition videos in Integrated Vision evoke a painterly quality and aim to provide a sensation of moving through space. Classically trained flutist, Paula Gudmundson is an Assistant Professor at the University of Minnesota Duluth. Performing nationally and internationally, Gudmundson began to improvise musically during her travels and explains, "Improv allows me to tap into different senses and with practice, becomes meditative." Together, Andrews and Gudmundson create a space for viewers to reflect, contemplate, and integrate the senses.

Acrylic Color Workshop

with Adam Swanson Wednesdays, 6 - 8:30 PM October 23 - November 13 \$150 (\$180 non-members) Infuse energy into your paintings by experimenting with color relationships and learning basic color theory under the guidance of local artist, Adam Swanson. Whether you are a beginning or an advanced acrylic painter, this class offers enough space to learn and grow with group and individual guidance. Open to all levels.

Landscapes and Intro to Watercolor with Bill Wise Thursdays, 10 AM - 1 PM October 24 - November 21 \$120 (\$140 non-members)

Review gestural and other techniques to get accurate drawings on the paper using charcoal and graphite pencils. Add color to your sketches using ink pens, water-soluble pencils, and watercolor paint. Community Felt Rug Making: Design Classes

Felt rug making is an art of storytelling. In this class we will begin Thursday evening by studying the felt rugs of Kyrgyzstan. What is the history of felt in the region? What do the designs mean? With lots of ideas in hand, we will come together Friday morning and begin to craft our own story for the rug we are making for the Duluth Public Library. Once we have the narrative for the rug, we will make templates and pre-felts over the course of three days, preparing all the materials and creating our design. You are welcome to sign up for one or all three days.

Community Felt Rug Making: Design Class Friday, 10 AM - 5 PM November 15 \$25/Session Duluth Folk School

This class is a continuation of the first three days in October and is when the design and hard work really begins to come together. We will be laying out the base layers, lightly felting them, and then adding our design on top of this base in preparation for the community felt making event the following day.

EXHIBITIONS



Shannon Cousino

October - December, 2019 Corridor Gallery

Shannon Cousino's work resonates with intensity, evoking raw emotions of hope and longing. This series taps into her personal journey seeking strength and celebration following the haunting and burning called up from loss. The work captures movement and fluidity while mirroring the perceived staticity one feels in the depths of grief. The large-scale wood cut prints evolved from photography, layer text, and stylized renderings of the heart over self-portraits. The foreshortened figure of What Doesn't Kill You fills the page, filigree design drops behind the figure symbolizing the carved façade of one in grief. According to Cousino, echoes the noise that surrounds grieving. Filigree flanks the figure in The New Normal and both images are accented with gold, smooth and reflective; inspired by Medieval illuminated manuscripts documenting stories of life and death. Cousino reflects on her current work, "This series focuses on themes of personal transformation through tragedy and the verbal clichés that are often said during attempts to comfort."

Cousino, Senior Lecturer at the University of Wisconsin – Superior and Adjunct Instructor at the College of St. Scholastica, has exhibited locally, regionally, and internationally. Her work has been collected by the Tweed Museum of Art and was awarded the 52nd Arrowhead Biennial Best of Show.

The Duluth Art Institute Lincoln Park Building houses many different activities such as a Printmaking Studio, Ceramics Studio, DAI offices, multi-purpose studio space, classes for youth and adults, summer art camps, and more. We also have a private artist studio that has been used in many different facets over the years. Most recently, we have been leasing this private studio space to artists.


MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Matt Kania

Born in the heart of Chicago and later raised in the farm country of Illinois, at an early age Matt Kania was instilled with a deep appreciation for both urban environments and wide open spaces. As a result, Kania's imagery tends to be eclectic - sometimes focusing on themes based in culture and at other times looking at themes that revolve around the natural world. A deeply rooted love for Lake Superior and northern landscapes eventually landed Kania in Duluth, Minnesota – where today he can be seen carrying his paint box to environs around the lake to paint 'en plein air' or mixing paints in his studio to work on his next composition.

How has art impacted you or your community?




Free Family Day


For 112 years, the DAI has contributed to the quality of life in the Northeast region as well as the economic development by attracting year-round tourism.
